The school was a result of active collaboration between the Sisters of Loretto and their sister community, The Daughters of the Most Blessed Trinity (FST) Sisters, who are the school's faculty, staff, and spiritual leaders.

During your Loretto Presidency from 2001 through 2006, a major change to facilitate wider participation in the Loretto Community took place. Can you describe what happened?

The 2000 General Assembly passed two resolutions that expanded the opportunities for wider participation by Loretto Community members — both vowed members and co-members — in the life of the community. The first, called the Community Forum, was seen as a tool for wider participation by having three elected representatives from the wider community join with the President and Executive Committee in addressing and refining community-wide issues, making connections, and helping the larger community. The purpose was to make connections with other issues and ideas. The three original non-Executive Committee members of the Community Forum were co-members Martha Alderson and Jeannine Swift and non-finally vowed member (at the time) Mary Margaret Murphy.

The Community Forum met for the first time on April 21, 2001, at the Motherhouse in Kentucky. From the outset these were conceived as open meetings with information in advance regarding the agenda, question-and-answer sessions with outside participants, and with notes distributed after each meeting. The Community Forum is an advisory group, not a decision-making group. And it was intended to make recommendations to the president around issues affecting the entire Loretto Community. These issues included considerations for candidates for appointment to Loretto committees, planning community-wide discussions, and offering topical gatherings and community-group agenda items.

Q **A** The Community Perspective Committee (CPC) was also formed as a result of the passage and adoption of a proposal at the 2000 General

Assembly. The CPC met for the first time in August 2001 in Denver, and consisted of representatives selected from each community group and elected leadership. As I stated at that first CPC meeting, “Today we take another step forward in our understanding of the role and function of Community Groups by establishing a linkage among community groups, and as a means of learning from one another’s experience of being a Community Group.”

Q **A** Why was this change needed, and why is it significant?

The establishment of the Community Forum and the CPC were changes presented from the grassroots of the membership and were voted upon by the elected delegates to the 2000 General Assembly. It was up to the newly elected president and executive committee to implement these changes, which have evolved during the ensuing decade. The significance of both the Community Forum and the CPC is that they have proven to be “tools for wider participation by Loretto Community members” and for effective communication between elected leadership and the community as a whole. They have already evolved and will continue to evolve, as community needs change over time.

Several “sister communities” were established between Loretto and other religious communities during the early 2000s. When, where, and why did this happen?

A “sister community” relationship with the Holy Family Sisters of Guatemala was established in 1993, at the urging of Loretto’s Latin American Caribbean Committee. Several committee members, including Mary Peter Bruce SL, had spent time with the Holy Family Sisters and sensed a connection between their history and Loretto’s. Sister Raquel Saravia gave a powerful talk about solidarity at our 1999 General Assembly. I can still

remember her words. A formal committee structure was voted on at the 2000 Assembly and an ad hoc committee was begun in 2001, resulting in the formation of separate committees in Guatemala and the United States. I was privileged to serve on this initial committee and to travel to Guatemala in the summer of 2003 for a joint meeting with the Holy Family Sisters Committee and to celebrate the 10th anniversary of our sister-community relationship. And Natalie Wing SL is serving as a local community development worker with the Holy Family Sisters in Guatemala. We will soon be celebrating the 20th anniversary of this relationship in 2013.

Q **A** In Ghana, the Loretto Africa Project began in 1993 through the efforts of Marie Ego SL, who was joined by Pauline Albin SL in the early 1990s. Marie encouraged a number of Loretto Community members to travel to Ghana for short periods to offer assistance with local projects. I actually took a sabbatical from my job in Denver to go there in 1994 for about six weeks. In fact, every living past-president of Loretto has spent time in Ghana. The Daughters of the Most Blessed Trinity (FST) Sisters based in Kumasi, Ghana, were a natural connection for us. They were established by the local bishop, Peter Sarpong, in 1984, and consisted of several dozen young, energetic members.

Two FST sisters came to North America to study in the 1990s

— Emily Owusu-Ansah and Eugenia Amporfu. Loretto became a home base for them during breaks from their studies. Emily became a Loretto co-member in 2004 and served as a Superior General of the FST sisters when she returned to Ghana.

Q A significant joint project, the building of the school in Akokoamong, was begun in 2005. Marian McAvoy SL and I were able to help secure an initial challenge grant from the Hilton Foundation for the school, which is now up and running.

A In addition, the Loretto-sponsored schools in the U.S. were encouraged to help build and shape the Ghanaian school, and several Nerinx Hall and St. Mary’s Academy students helped with the actual set up of the classrooms. In 2005 I spoke to the Loretto school administrators and issued a challenge to them to get involved on many different levels in connecting with the Akokoamong school. That was the genesis of their travels there to paint, decorate and furnish the classrooms, making them ready for the school children.

What is the status of those sister communities today?

Both relationships are going strong. “Community is for mission,” as we say in *I Am the Way*.

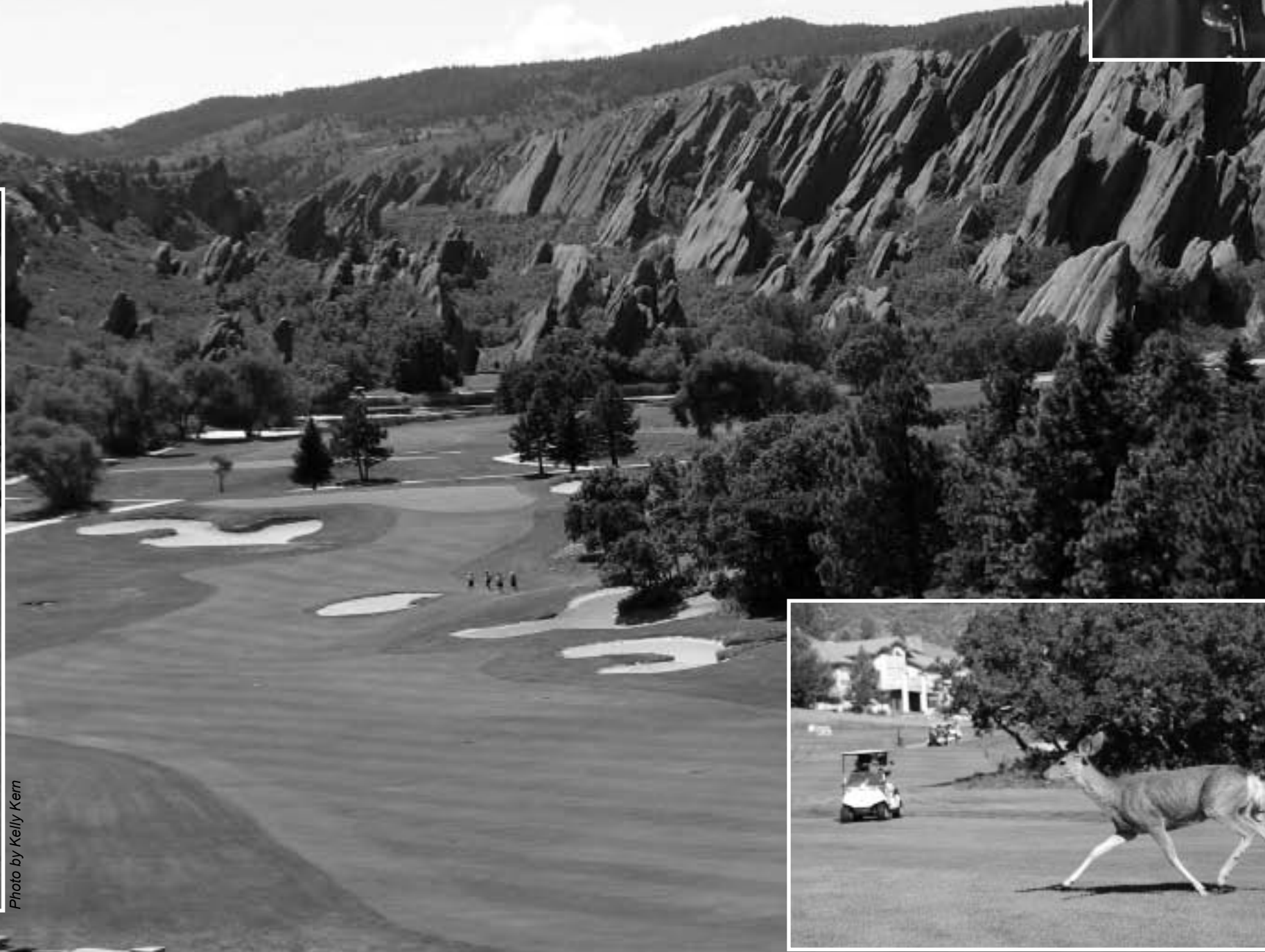

Michaela Collins SL, October 7, 1912 — July 10, 2011

Helen Elizabeth Collins was born in Colorado Springs, Colo., to William and Mary Ann O'Sullivan Collins. She had an older sister and younger brother. She attended St. Mary's Grade and High School in Colorado Springs, and earned her A.B. degree in 1934 at Loretto Heights College in Denver. Helen's older sister joined Loretto and became Sr. Mariella Collins. Helen followed her into the Loretto novitiate in 1940, taking the name Sr. Mary Michaela. Michaela taught at Loretto Academy in St. Louis from 1942 to 1952, and at St. Mary's Academy in Denver from 1952 to 1955. She taught Latin at Nerinx Hall High School in St. Louis from 1955 to 1958, and then at Webster College where she was appointed Dean in 1961 and later Registrar. She was coordinator of Loretto Center for 24 years until retiring to the Loretto Motherhouse, Nerinx, Ky., in 2005. Michaela died there at age 98 in the 71st year of her life as a Sister of Loretto.



Marie Patrice Hoare SL, May 29, 1926 — July 15, 2011

Theresa Hoare and her four siblings were born in Colorado to Patrick and Mary Breen Hoare. Theresa and her sister Anne both joined the Sisters of Loretto; Theresa (Sr. Marie Patrice) in 1948, followed by Anne (Sr. Gabriel Mary) in 1951. Marie Patrice graduated from Holy Family High School in Denver, and earned her A.B. degree from Webster College in 1955, and a master's degree in education from Notre Dame University in 1962. She began teaching in 1948 and continued for nearly 50 years in schools in St. Louis, Kansas City, Alabama, California, and Texas. From 1969 to 2011 she lived in El Paso, teaching at Loretto Academy and serving several years as sacristan. She died at age 85 at Loretto Motherhouse in her 65th year as a Sister of Loretto.



Carolyn Mary Tighe SL, December 18, 1917 — July 25, 2011

Alice Cecilia Tighe was the fourth daughter born to Alice and Eugene Tighe in Chicago. The Tighes eventually raised six daughters and two sons. The family moved to Colorado while Alice was an infant. Alice graduated from St. Mary's Academy, Denver, in 1935, and became a Loretto novice later that year, following three of her older sisters who had already joined Loretto. Alice, now Sr. Carolyn Mary, earned her A.B. degree at Webster College in St. Louis in 1953, and a master's in education at Loyola University in Los Angeles in 1966. From 1937 to 1975, Carolyn Mary taught school in Kentucky, Texas, Missouri, California, Arizona, and Colorado, where she settled in 1975. She later worked on staff at a nursing home and daycare center in Colorado Springs, and in 1980 was hired as director of religious education at Guadalupe Parish. She died in her home at age 93.



Marian Disch SL (formerly Mary Rosetta SL), January 25, 1917 — August 6, 2011

Marian Disch was one of three children born to Aloysius and Anna McLaughlin Disch in St. Louis. She was educated by the Sisters of St. Joseph and the Notre Dame Sisters, and studied for a year at Webster College. In 1936 she entered Loretto as a novice. As Sr. Mary Rosetta, she pronounced her first vows in 1939, and final vows in 1942. Her first teaching mission was Immaculate Conception in Missouri in 1939, but illness necessitated her transfer to Colorado in 1945 and later to El Paso, Texas, where she enjoyed teaching for seven years. After other assignments in various Loretto schools, Marian became interested in the St. Louis Archdiocese's newly created department of special education. She began studying for an M.A. in special education in 1957 and worked as a teacher, tutor, and volunteer in this field for 17 years. She moved to the Loretto Motherhouse in 1989, where she researched land use and land trusts for the community. She died there at age 94.



Katharine Kharas CoL, February 11, 1935 — August 20, 2011

Katharine Kharas was born in Syracuse, N.Y., where she attended the neighborhood schools through her sophomore year in high school. The family moved to Manhattan, where Katharine attended a large public all-girls school. She met the Loretto Community years later as a mathematics faculty member at Syracuse University. This friendship led to a faculty position at Webster College in St. Louis. She applied for Loretto co-membership in 1991. Katharine also taught math in the San Diego Junior College District and was part of a workshop staff who gave in-service education to math teachers around the country. At age 76, she died in hospice care in Syracuse.



Patricia Margaret Toner SL (formerly Gregory Ann SL), March 26, 1930 — September 7, 2011

Pat Toner was born in Louisville, Ky., to William G. and Evelyn W. Toner. She attended St. Benedict Elementary and Loretto High School, both Loretto schools, and after graduation entered the novitiate in 1948. She made final vows in 1954. Music was her life, and she earned bachelor's and master's degrees in music education from Webster College in St. Louis and DePaul University in Chicago respectively. For 42 years Pat taught music in the classroom and privately. She died at age 81 at the Motherhouse in her 63rd year as a Sister of Loretto.
